The foundation continues to work with individuals. families and organizations to create custom funds through which each one's unique philanthropic goals can be accomplished. We also continue to provide funding to local nonprofits through our 3 annual Community Impact grant cycles and feature one from each cycle in this issue's "Grant Spotlight."

GREENWOOD WOMEN CARE

Caring Women Building Community

In early October of 2017, Greenwood Women Care (GWC) received the first contributions for 2018 membership. By the end of April 2018, GWC was 104 Charter Members strong!

In 12 short months, GWC has begun to fulfill its mission to be an organization of Caring Women Building Community. Four Quarterly Meetings, planned by the Programs and Education and Social Committees, focused on significant activity to improve the quality of life in Greenwood County. In February, quest speakers presented local nonprofit efforts and entities in arts and culture and social services. May's program was "Offering Hope: Services for Women and Children in Crisis". The August meeting featured "Back by Popular Demand: The Penguin Project", and "Homelessness and Hunger in our Hometown" were discussed in the November meeting. A "Charter Members' Celebration" in April and "A Farm Drop-In" in October, two social evenings, were also highlights of the year.

The GWC Grants Review and Awards Committee developed a sound grants process and offered a grant-writing workshop to the community in the fall. Sixteen local nonprofits submitted applications for funding in GWC's inaugural granting cycle. GWC 2019 Grant awards were based on ranked voting by the full membership in late February of 2019.

Through pooling the resources of Members made in their annual contributions and other gifts to the GWC Granting Fund, GWC has created a new source of funding for Greenwood County nonprofits. The Granting Fund continues to grow through annual Membership contributions and additional gifts. GWC Members are excited to see the results of their first year of collective granting for impact in our community!

GWC is comprised of women who have diverse personal and professional experiences, live in many neighborhoods, enjoy an array of other community activities, and vary in age over more than 50 years. Membership is open at all times to any interested woman who commits to the GWC Membership contribution, renewable annually.

Members are kept informed of events and other key information through the efforts of the GWC Communications Committee. Current information is also found on GWC's webpage.

GWC's Governance and Finance Committee sets policies and identifies leadership. The GWC Steering Committee provides guidance to Standing Committees, identifies aims for GWC's growth and flourishing, and is committed to articulating and demonstrating core values of GWC.

GWC has hosted dozens of guests at six primary events in 2018, and looks forward to meeting more interested women at future events. This practice is consistent with GWC's mission to inform community-minded women about community needs and opportunities, both broadly and specifically.

As an initiative of GCCF, GWC has received substantial material, in-kind, and staff support in its founding year. GWC represents grassroots philanthropy at its finest. GCCF is delighted to have played a pivotal role in the development of this dynamic organization that brings a diverse cohort of women together to learn, give, and grow!

2018 GRANT SPOTLIGHTS

GCCF Community Impact Grants are awarded annually in three, regular cycles. Grant Applicants may request up to \$5000 in funding for a program or project serving residents of Greenwood County. In 2018, GCCF awarded funding to a total of 26 Nonprofit organizations, including 13 receiving GCCF funding for the first time.

Three of these first-time recipients in our three Community Impact grant cycles are highlighted here.

COMMUNITY ENHANCEMENT

The John and Lula Welton Life Enrichment Initiative staged a full musical theatre production of James Weldon Johnson's God's Trombones which engaged a cast and crew of 50 people including directors, actors, singers, dancers, and stage crew. Two evening performances were presented to full houses of 500 at Little River Multicultural Complex on October 26–27, 2018.

This literary work presented inspirational sermons in the form of poetry, coupled with gospel music to contemporize its historical message. "God's Trombones addresses struggles of life without resorting to stereotypes or music that glorifies self-destructive behavior. As the production began to take shape, cast members became motivated, self-confident, worked above and beyond what was required, and enjoyed the musical theatre process.", said Pacquitta Coleman, Executive Director of Welton Life Initiative and Musical director of God's Trombones.

GCCF funding provided support to secure highly skilled musicians and a professional sound and lighting company, both of which are vital to a quality musical theatre production.

YOUTH AND EDUCATION

Panola United Methodist Church, in cooperation with Mathews, Trinity, and Lowell Street United Methodist Churches, received funding to conduct a literacy program entitled "I Can Make a Difference" over six weeks in the summer. Mamie Love, who completed training in the Children's Defense Fund's Freedom School model, directed the program held at Mathews UMC.

The Rev. Mike Evans noted, "I Can Make a Difference' is intended to mitigate the 'summer slide' for participating students known as 'Scholars'. This program provided enrichment to help Scholars fall in love with reading, increase their self-esteem, and generate more positive attitudes toward learning, using a curriculum that supports children and families around five essential components: I Can Make a Difference in myself, in my family, in my community,



in my country, and in my world. This language-based program also included: field trips related to the curriculum, weekly parent meetings, a fine arts component, and donation of books studied during each week for Scholars to take home to begin their own personal libraries."

OPEN GRANTING

Connie Maxwell Children's Home has been serving children and families in Greenwood County since 1892. In keeping with their mission to serve children in need of secure housing and a loving home, Connie Maxwell sought funding from GCCF toward establishing their "Fostering Families" program.

Paula Reed, Director of Foster Care noted, "Becoming a foster parent is a long, drawn out process. Families think about fostering for years before they actually take the first step. Once they finally do, families get discouraged during the process because it can really be daunting."

Connie Maxwell's "Fostering Families" program is an initiative to license more foster homes in Greenwood County. "Connie Maxwell Children's Home is a fully accredited licensing agency for

families interested in foster care. Once individuals begin the licensing process, they are paired with a Connie Maxwell licensing worker that encourages them and serves as a resource," Reed said. Once the process is complete, participants will be eligible to have SC DSS children placed in their homes.

Connie Maxwell staff members are implementing the "Fostering Families" program. Paula Reed, Director of Foster Care; Haleigh Moore, Foster Care Specialist; Diane Turner, Foster Care Licensing and Training Coordinator.

For Herman and Alison Fletcher one word defines how they live, and how they give.

Herman, who grew up in northwest Georgia, and Alison, a self-described air force brat who lived all around the world, consider Greenwood to be their home. They originally arrived in 1995, when Herman took over general operations management for the Cooper Power Systems location in Greenwood. 8 years later, however, Herman was transferred to a facility in Wisconsin where he and Alison lived until 2008. As Herman states, "they (Cooper Power Systems) graciously agreed to let us return to Greenwood" when the allure and familiarity of southern culture and climate beckoned. "We've lived in Greenwood 19 years, which is longer than any single location in either of our lives."

Central to the Fletcher's life in Greenwood is their church home. Both Rock Presbyterian Church, and Westminster Presbyterian Church before that, have played an integral role in the Fletcher's transition to established residents and engaged citizens of Greenwood County. Their pastor, Chris Leonard, did not meet the Fletchers until they returned to Greenwood in 2008. "Everyone kept telling me, 'you really should have known the Fletchers. They were so integral to our church,' said Leonard. "Of course they were right, and what a blessing it is to have them back in town and back in the fold."

The Fletcher's have always been generous to causes of importance to them, but were not fully aware of the Greenwood County Community Foundation (GCCF) and how it could streamline their charitable giving. But after receiving referrals from their financial advisor and estate attorney, they sought more information and learned how their investment in GCCF not only helps them simplify their giving, but helps the community as well. "We spent a lot of time learning about the goals of the Greenwood County Community Foundation," Herman said, "and as we learned more, we realized how our investment helps the foundation grow, which also helps nonprofits in Greenwood do their work." It was the Fletcher's faithful diligence that led to the realization that GCCF would be a good partner in their charitable giving mission. "The more you're invested in something personally, the more you feel that strong sense of connection." Alison has taken that statement to the next level with her engagement with GCCF's initiative Greenwood Women Care. She has been deeply involved in this women's giving collective as a charter member and a member of the group's Grants Committee, which will oversee the first gifts (totaling \$40,000 or more) in 2019.

Loyalty and dedication play a big role in Herman and Alison's giving decisions. Each supports their respective alma maters, as well as the Self Regional Healthcare Foundation, World Vision and Ligonlier Ministries. But it is their church home that always comes first. "We try to be faithful to the commands found in the Bible and support our church as we're instructed," added Herman. "We prefer to give generously to a smaller number of charities instead of taking a scattershot approach and giving smaller amounts to a large number of nonprofits."
