One of our donors recently brought in this message from C. S. Lewis; I believe it is worth sharing . . .

. . as it so clearly embodies the imperative of community foundation work:

"I think each village was meant to feel pity for its own sick and poor who it can help, and I doubt it is the duty of any private person to fix his mind on ills when he cannot help. This may even come an escape from the works of charity we really can do to those we know. God may call any one of us to respond to some far away problem or support those who have been so called. But we are finite and He will not call us everywhere or to support every worthy cause. And real needs are not far from us."

The work of community foundations is to be LOCAL and STRATEGIC in meeting human need and increasing the livability of our own village. This means starting at home-getting to really know our closest neighbors and responding to their needsmowing a lawn, changing a light bulb, carrying a paper to a porch. Then, we can reach out to those throughout our towns--providing tools to self-sufficiency, tutoring those with educational difficulties, creating places for food and housing.

When all of us, throughout the land, take responsibility for making our own locales stronger, healthier and more vibrant, then our entire nation and ALL of our inhabitants will be richer.


One great thing about a Donor Advised Fund is that you can make ONE gift when it is most tax-advantageous and



then recommend grants from that Fund at your leisure. And making a wide VARIETY of grants is exactly what our Fundholders have been up to lately!

Grants to organizations that our donors care deeply about, such as the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation, may not be unusual. Nor might a grant to the American Red Cross. That organization will use their grant to provide food, shelter and medications in the immediate aftermath of a disaster.

But...when one donor recommended we send a check to 24 Hours of Booty, our eyebrows were certainly raised. Sure enough, staff researched the organization and its work, and the Board approved the grant. This is a 24-hour cycling event to raise local and national funds in the fight against cancer. The



event brings together cyclists of all abilities and unites people who are passionate about fighting this disease. Held on a traffic-free loop, the event has raised more than \$7 million since 2002.

Never Too Early (Seldom too Late) For Year-End Tax Planning

Last year as one of our busy (read: procrastinating) donors began yearend tax planning in mid-December, her accountant suggested that she consider increasing her charitable contributions. The advisor knows that giving back is an important piece of this client's life, and it will help reduce her taxes.

The generous client agreed with the advice but expressed concern about not having much time to consider which community organizations to support with a gift. She also had misgivings about donating a large sum of money to one charity.

"If I give it this year, they may expect as much or more in years to come.

And, I need more time to think strategically about my giving," she said. The accountant encouraged her to consider using the community foundation as a flexible vehicle that will allow her to delay and also fulfill her varied charitable interests.

She met with GCCF's professional grant-making staff to discuss giving choices and elected to establish a donor-advised Fund in the name of her family, allowing them to stay actively involved in suggesting gifts from the Fund for years to come, while providing an immediate tax deduction in the year the gift is made.

Each year, the donor will meet with foundation staff to recommend gifts from the Fund. She, and later her family, can take advantage of the community foundation's knowledge of

local needs and resources to find the charitable organizations and projects that best match her interests.

Because the community foundation is a public charity, it offers the highest level of tax benefits for charitable giving. Donors can match high-income years with high charitable tax deductions that generate long-term community benefits. In addition, donors can add to their donor-advised fund any time they wish and integrate further contributions within their overall financial and estate plan.
