The Greenwood County Community Foundation (GCCF) held its fourth Awards Gala on Tuesday, November 2nd at the Greenwood Country Club celebrating those individuals who seek to make a philanthropic or altruistic difference in their community.

The evening began with the three “Founding Fathers” of the Community Foundation: Sam Leaman, Peter Manning and Sam Tolbert being presented awards for their efforts in establishing the community foundation in 2009. Leaman was also honored for his service as he prepares to leave the Board of Directors at the end of the year.

The evening’s agenda then moved to the presentation of four awards. The “Mays Legacy” award was presented to Rev. Doug and Sally Kauffmann for establishing the Dr. Benjamin E. Mays Endowed Chair at Lander University. Also recognized with “Mays Legacy” awards were the Self Family Foundation and Mamie and Floyd Nicholson.

The Duke Energy “Citizenship and Service” award was presented to Chuck Fox, retired Air Force Brigadier General and retired owner of the Greenwood REMAX Real Estate office. Fox was honored for his many years of service to the Greenwood Rotary Club, The Greenwood Veterans Center, the Blue Ridge Council of the Boy Scouts of America and his church, South Main Baptist.

The Community Foundation made its two award presentations: The “Spirit of Philanthropy” and the “Lifetime of Philanthropy.” The “Spirit of Philanthropy” award seeks to recognize and honor those people who, in recent years, have demonstrated an unselfish regard for their community neighbors, a concern for the advancement of human welfare, and a desire to promote the common good. Because of their dedication to addressing key issues in the community, and their desire to address the root causes of issues, the 2021 “Spirit” recipients were Joe and Vickie Chandler.

The final award of the evening recognized a couple who have lived a life of service. The “Lifetime of Philanthropy” award, given to recognize and honor those whose philanthropic resume reflects an abiding love of our community, was presented to Floyd and Mamie Nicholson. Their combined lifetime of contributions in Greenwood County have resulted in significant positive growth and profound improvement in the community’s quality of life.

“These awards are just a small recognition of the huge impact our recipients have had on this community,” said current GCCF board Chair, John Patrick. “Our goal is to bring awareness to those selfless individuals who do so much and improve life for so many in Greenwood. We are truly honored to be partners with all of them in these great philanthropic endeavors.” The Community Foundation has tentatively set its next awards gala date for spring of 2023.

New Officers & Board Members for 2022

GCCF recently announced new board roles for 2022. Voya financial advisor, John Patrick, will serve a second year as Chair of the Board of Directors, with board member Herman Fletcher becoming the Chair-Elect. Fletcher, recently retired as Vice President of Eaton Corporation's Cooper Power Systems plant, has served on numerous boards in the community and he and his wife, Alison, are very active members of Rock Presbyterian Church. Donna Foster, Vice President for Compliance and Institutional Effectiveness at Piedmont Technical College, will assume the At Large role on the board's Executive Committee. Foster is a founding member and current Steering Committee member of the Million Women Mentors S.C. Steering Team; member of the Greenwood Chamber of Commerce's Women's Leadership Council; current President of the South Carolina Association for Institutional Researchers; and various other educational associations and organizations. Current board officers, Treasurer Trentsie Williams and Secretary Dr. Gay McHugh, will retain their roles on the Executive Committee.

GCCF will also see several new faces on the board in 2022. New members are Sabrina Miller, Rhonda McGinnis, Chuck Moates, and Tee Tunstall. Sabrina Miller is the Executive Director of Boys and Girls Clubs of the Lakelands. Rhonda McGinnis is a semi-retired attorney licensed in the states of South Carolina and Mississippi and has served on the governing boards of several nonprofit entities, including Hospice and Palliative Care of the Piedmont, Hospice Care Foundation of the Piedmont and Greenwood Women Care. Chuck Moates retired to Greenwood after 40 years as a parish minister in Atlanta, Georgia. He currently serves as a deacon at First Baptist Church of Greenwood and as Chairman of the Greenwood County Council. He formerly served as Chairman of the Edgewood Cemetery & Mausoleum Board and is a member of the Greenwood Rotary Club. Billy A. Tunstall, III (Tee) joined The Manning Law Firm as an associate attorney in 2020. He focuses on Estate planning, business transactions, probate matters and tax controversies. Tee currently serves as President of the Greenwood County Bar Association, Vice President of the Greenwood Museum and Railroad Historical Center, and as a Board Member of the Arts Center of Greenwood. He is also a member of the 2021-2022 Leadership Greenwood class and of Main Street United Methodist Church.

In 2021, Greenwood Women Care concluded our fourth membership year and third granting cycle. Miss Ordaz attends Erskine College.




Community Foundation presents "Community Hero" award to *Bacote-Lagroon*

Since 2013, Deloris Bacote-Lagroon has led a cadre of dedicated community volunteers in producing the Westside Summer Youth Camps in the W.S. Harrison Community Development Center on the Macedonia Baptist Church campus. On Tuesday, May 25th, the Greenwood County Community Foundation (GCCF) bestowed its prestigious Community Hero award to Ms. Bacote-Lagroon in honor and recognition of the outstanding work she continues every summer to provide educational and social enrichment opportunities for the approximately 60 – 75 children who annually attend the camp.

The award recognizes those "who do exceptional things in our community with no thought of reward or recognition." The Community Hero award was established by Greenwood physician, and former GCCF Board member, Dr. Juke Leary to honor the unsung heroes of the community.

The summer camp offers children enrichment opportunities in language arts, math, science explorations, and technology, while fostering positive self-awareness and community leadership potential. It is funded through the generosity of other church groups and community organizations, pledges from Macedonia Baptist Church members, and other donors.

COMMUNITY HERO

The Greenwood County Community Foundation holds tax-deductible endowed and non-endowed funds for individuals, nonprofit organizations, and scholarships.

2021 Innovation Grant Awarded to Community Initiatives

Greenwood County Community Foundation awards its bi-annual Innovation Grant to provide substantial support for a program or project with the promise of significant community impact. In June, Community Initiatives (CI) received a \$50,000 grant for the establishment of a Free Dental Clinic.

Community Initiatives is drawing from their current patient base at their free health clinic, La Clinica Gratis, and expanding the clinic to include others in need of dental services. CI collaborates with local dentists and staff to implement the Free Dental Clinic and plans to engage other local nonprofits and students from SC dental programs by the second year of clinic operations.

As the Free Dental Clinic began operations in 2021, Teresa Goodman, CI Executive Director, noted, "The amazing partnership and long-term plan to make dental care affordable for everyone is being realized through this grant. Greenwood County Community Foundation was able to see the vision and, through the Innovation Grant, allowed us to make dental care accessible and affordable. The overall health of patients has improved, and we are now armed with the information needed to continue to build a sustainable dental care model that will serve for years to come." Ben Dunlap, DMD, of Whole Life Dental reiterated the importance of this clinic: "Basic preventative care can reduce the need for expensive restorative treatments when performed correctly and carefully. Unfortunately, the most vulnerable in our community currently have few options for receiving this care. We are blessed with the partnership of Community Initiatives and the Greenwood County Community Foundation. We are truly humbled by this opportunity to serve our neighbors in need."

A family member of a participant in the Free Dental Clinic shared this story: "I would like to say that I am very thankful for being able to have a dentist. My mom suffered from tooth decay and bone loss due to diabetes and being toothless was very traumatic and horrific for her. She was depressed for some time but when she got the opportunity to get her dentures through Community Initiatives and Whole Life Dental, she was the happiest person ever. She is full of gratitude and her life and health have been changed because if her teeth were to stay the way they would have caused her more health issues."

The Foundation is pleased to support the development of projects of such benefit to our community!

VELUX® GROUP USA SIGNS ON AS FIRST "10-10-10" COMMUNITY RESPONSE FUND PARTNER

Multi-year commitment will provide needed funding to responding agencies in times of natural and other disasters in Greenwood County

The Greenwood County Community Foundation (GCCF) announced the creation of a Community Response Fund in collaboration with the Greenwood County Emergency Services Department to provide financial assistance to responding agencies during widespread community crises, such as natural disasters. VELUX Group USA signed on as the first of a future group of 10 industry-spanning organizations to join the fund's "10-10-10" team.

"We are tremendously appreciative of VELUX's pledge to support the future of this community," said Jeff Smith, president of Greenwood County Community Foundation. "With their leadership, we hope to inspire and invite other local businesses and individuals to join us as proactive 10-10-10 team members."

GCCF aims to recruit 10 corporate investors each contributing \$10,000 per year for 10 years. Once established, the endowed fund will be immediately available to provide financial assistance to responding agencies in the event of a natural or man-made disaster, or any other occurrence that affects a large segment of the Greenwood County population.

"We are proud to join GCCF in this dedicated, future-focused effort that aims to ensure safety, security and recovery for the residents in the community in which our employees live and work," said Keith Polatty, senior director of people and organization at VELUX Group USA. "For us, it was a no-brainer."

GCCF has been serving the Greenwood community since 2011 and is a longtime partner of local area agencies, such as the American Red Cross, Salvation Army, and other nonprofit organizations that provide relief in times of disaster or other hardships. The foundation's board of directors has also committed to seed the fund at the same \$10,000-level for ten years. 

